By partnering with our Every Day Matters (EDM) Specialist from the ESD, we've noted positive strides in student attendance, achieved through the implementation of incentive programs. Overcoming previous challenges in this area, we've seen substantial progress. Additionally, our responsiveness to community input, garnered through surveys, has driven us to enhance our educational offerings comprehensively. This includes introducing a high school automotive repair class, hosting an Artist in Residence program, and having a teacher rear trout in her classroom.

#2 - WHAT BARRIERS OR CHALLENGES TO SIA IMPLEMENTATION HAVE YOU EXPERIENCED THAT ARE HELPFUL FOR YOUR COMMUNITY AND/OR STATE LEADERS TO BE AWARE OF? WHAT ADJUSTMENTS, IF ANY, DID YOU MAKE TO YOUR SIA PLAN AS A RESULT OF THESE CHALLENGES?

Our primary obstacle has centered around staffing shortages and the difficulty in securing individuals to meet our specific service requirements. Collaborating with the ESD, we engaged in a "Grow Your Own" counselor program, ensuring that we will have a counselor for the upcoming year. Moreover, unfilled aid positions prompted us to strategize alternative ways to support students effectively. Lastly, our initial plan to designate Fridays as catch-up days for students faced lower-than-anticipated participation, leading us to adjust our intervention strategies within the school day.

Reengaging with the community was a top priority that we saw was needed with our Integrated Guidance (IG) Needs Assessment. We have worked very hard to utilize social media and post regularly about school happenings to keep the community informed about what is happening in the school. We have also had regular community dinners and gatherings that are starting to be highly attended, a change that didn't happen a few years ago.

Our primary challenge at the beginning of the previous year was the noticeable gap between the school and the community, prompting us to devise strategies for enhancing relations. Notably, our community dinners have proven highly effective, as have collaborations with local businesses and the active use of social media to showcase school activities. Recognizing the significance of these efforts, we have incorporated them into our Integrated Guidance (IG) plan. The focus remains on bridging the gap between the school and the community through these impactful initiatives.
